

Smart grid improvements are currently underway in the Arkansas Valley Electric Cooperative Corporation (AVECC) service territory. The Department of Energy (DOE) GRIP grant awarded AVECC with \$18 million in 2023 to strengthen the resilience, reliability and affordability for members across 14 counties.

The smart grid project began in 2018 with a system wide fiber buildout which was completed earlier this year.

Now, the next step is the implementation of the "Beyond AMI to True Grid Intelligence with Distributed Automation" project.

"Grid resiliency and modernization are a priority of AVECC," said CEO Al Simpson. "We began our Smart Grid project in 2018, and we are fortunate to be awarded this critical funding to advance and accelerate our ultimate goals of providing safe, reliable, and affordable power."

During this project, AVECC will:

- Replace 66,000 meters with advanced smart
- Install 2,400 fiber mini-aps to expand communication capabilities.
- Upgrade 1,200 reclosers, 200 regulator panels, and more than 150 capacitor panels to improve outage response and voltage regulation.

System Engineer Samantha Renard said, "Being able to build out this infrastructure really gets to serve our members. They not only get the data for their energy usage, but we can also make them a more efficient grid which allows us to always provide reliable and responsible power, while reducing costs and putting dollars back in their pockets.

Engineering Manager Chris Howe added, "From the membership standpoint, it's going to be a lot better reliability coming along. The metering is going to start reporting automatically, letting us know when things are off. The amount of data we're getting back is tremendously more than what we have now."

The updates will be completed in phases over the next four years. An approximate timeline is:

Smart Grid - Reclosers, Capacitors and Regulators

2027 - Sequoyah, Crawford, Adair, Sebastian and Scott counties

Small Heaters Can Lead to Fires, Bigger Bills

During winter, for many of us, comfort at home

Space heaters get seasonal use, but they are responsible for 25,000 residential fires a year, according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, which pegs the annual mortality rate at 300 a year. Burn injuries associated with surface contacts with room heaters send about 6,000 people to emergency rooms every year, and most of those incidents don't result in fires.

Because the devices are designed to give off heat, they should always be set in locations clear of all flammable materials and out of reach of small children, pets or anyone with impaired mobility.

"Space heaters are not the ideal solution for heating homes," said Brian Sloboda, a senior program manager for the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA). "For every unit of electricity that is consumed by these devices, they produce one unit of heat."

While adding several space heaters to supplement your central heating system is also likely to drive up your energy costs, selective use may help you save some money.

According to analysts at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the key is using space heaters in smaller rooms that are occupied infrequently, in conjunction with lower thermostat settings on your central system.

Lowering thermostat settings from 70 to 65 degrees and using a thermostatcontrolled space heater to heat 10% of a home's conditioned floor space will save a heat pump user an estimated \$67 a

year. But the EPA cautions that space heaters can actually waste energy, causing increased electric bills, if consumers try to heat too much area with the devices.

There are currently no space heaters among the EPA's list of ENERGY STAR®-rated products. Agency officials said they have evaluated several models but have no plans to include such products in the labeling program in the near future.

Still, high-end space heaters are heavily marketed during the winter months. An energyefficiency expert at your local electric co-op can help determine if a space heater is right for your home.


"They may suggest other alternatives, like sealing air leaks, adding insulation or tuning up your heating system so it operates more efficiently," said Sloboda. "Those are just a few of the options that won't increase your overall energy use."

Stock up on quality brands for bulbs that will last and that fit every fixture, from warm white to daylight tones, ensuring long-term savings on your electric bill. Also look for LED Christmas lights and décor to celebrate the season without bumping up the bill.

Caulk and weatherstripping: Seal the deal

Drafts around windows and doors can account for 10-20% of home energy loss, especially in the coming colder winter months. Caulk and weatherstripping are affordable fixes — costing as little as \$5-\$15 per tube or roll. Deals often include bundles or discounts on silicone caulk and foam weatherstrips. Applying these in a weekend can save up to \$200 annually on heating and cooling by preventing air leaks.

Spray foam: Expand your savings

Spray foam insulation, like Great Stuff or Touch 'n Seal, fills gaps in walls, attics and crawlspaces, reducing energy loss by up to 20%. A \$10 spray foam can might save \$50 or more yearly on energy bills. Look for specials at hardware stores, where bulk kits or multi-packs are often discounted 15-25%, making it an ideal time to tackle those hard-to-reach spots.

Insulation: Wrap up efficiency

Proper insulation can cut energy costs by 30% in poorly insulated homes. Fiberglass batts or blown-in cellulose are cost-effective options, with savings of \$200 to \$500 per year. Stores may offer deals on insulation rolls or bags, sometimes with free rental of blowing machines, maximizing your investment.

In most cases, improving your home's energy efficiency will also improve your comfort. Most people look for measures they can take inside their homes to make improvements. However, there are things you can do outside your home that can also make a difference. One of those things is strategically planting trees. How can trees improve the energy efficiency of your home?

Shading

When you consider the energy-efficiency advantages of trees, shading is probably the first thing you think about, and for good reason.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, carefully positioned trees can reduce a household's energy consumption for heating and cooling by up to 25%.

You might think that planting trees to the south of your home would be best, but be mindful of the sun's position in the sky when shading is most needed. Planting trees to the east and west of your home, instead of the south, is more beneficial during summer and winter months. The sun is high midday summer, and trees will not cast a long shadow. If you avoid planting trees to the south of your home, this will allow the sun to help keep your home warm during the winter.

Consider planting a tree that will prevent direct sunlight from adversely affecting your outdoor air conditioner or heat pump. A tree that loses its leaves during winter would be ideal. The leaves will help block direct sunlight during summer and allow the sun to warm your heat pump during winter.



Windbreaks

Evergreen trees planted to the north and northwest of your home will help break cold winter winds. The percentage of your home's conditioned air that is replaced by unconditioned outside air through the cracks and crevices of your home (all homes have them) is increased as wind speeds increase. If you can slow down the wind before it strikes the surface of your home, you will slow your home's leakage rate. This, in turn, will cause your heating system to operate less and cost you less money on your energy bill.

Safety

At Carroll Electric, the SAFETY of our employees and the public is always our top priority. Please be mindful of overhead and underground power lines when planting trees. Know how big your tree will be (height and radius). Ensure that when the tree is fully mature, it will be a minimum of 15 lateral feet from any overhead power line. Also, dial 8-1-1 before you dig to avoid coming into contact with underground power lines.

Capital credits returned to members

The Clay County Electric Board of Directors approved a capital credit retirement of \$508,393. With this year's retirement, Clay County Electric has retired approximately \$24 million to our members since 1938. Members should receive their capital credit checks by mid-December.

While this year's retirement amount is lower than some previous years, it reflects the financial impacts of multiple storms and the lack of FEMA funding for the March storms. Despite these challenges, Clay County Electric remains committed to returning margins to our members whenever possible.

The retirement of capital credits is a tangible demonstration of your ownership in Clay County Electric. As a member-owned cooperative, we operate as a not-for-profit utility. This is accomplished through the retirement of capital credits.

Keep holiday meals joyful — avoid fires and injuries

Deep-frying a turkey can be delicious, but it's also one of the riskiest ways to cook. Before you plug in or fire up a fryer, follow these safety tips:

Set up safely

- Use outdoor fryers at least 10 feet away from buildings, garages and overhangs.
- Place the fryer on a flat, sturdy surface and don't move it once it's heating.
- Never leave a fryer unattended.
- Keep children and pets at least 3 feet away.

Prevent burns and fires

- Wear oven mitts and use long utensils to avoid contact with hot surfaces and oil.
- Test the oil level before cooking. Fill the fryer with water and lower the turkey in to see how much liquid is needed. Dry everything completely before adding oil.
- Use a fully thawed and dry turkey never fry a frozen one.

Monitor temperatures

- Use a thermometer to make sure oil is at the recommended temperature.
- Avoid overloading outlets if using an electric fryer; unplug other appliances before use.

Smart Tip:

Consider using an electric fryer or going oil-free with an air fryer for safer indoor cooking options.




Here's how it will work:

OZARKS CARES GIVES BACK \$61,638 Distributed to **Local Nonprofits**

Ozarks Electric Cooperative's Ozarks Cares program is once again making a difference in the region, distributing \$61,638 to support nonprofits that serve vulnerable populations across Arkansas and Oklahoma.



Each year, Ozarks Electric employees contribute a portion of their paychecks, with every dollar matched by the cooperative. The combined total is then awarded to local organizations working on the front lines of need. This year's Arkansas recipients span causes from youth development to homelessness and community support.

Grant Recipients and Their Missions

Saving Grace NWA — \$18,734

Saving Grace provides safe, stable housing and wraparound services for young women ages 18-25 who have aged out of foster care or face homelessness. In addition to dorm-style housing, the program equips participants with life skills coaching, educational and employment support, financial literacy training, mentoring and counseling. The goal is to break cycles of instability and equip young women for successful, independent adulthood.

With this year's support, Saving Grace can expand its spaces, strengthen mentorship opportunities and enhance resources to help participants transition into thriving independent lives. The

organization is also in a "Phase II" expansion, a growth project aimed at increasing capacity so even more young women can be welcomed into its safe and supportive community.

CASA - \$10,000

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) works through trained volunteers to advocate for the best interests of children in the foster care and child welfare systems. Volunteers are often the one constant presence in a child's life as they navigate court hearings, foster placements and uncertain family situations. 

IMPORTANT NOTICE: 2024 Patronage Capital

Notice is hereby given members of Rich Mountain Electric Cooperative, Inc. that, in accordance with the provisions of the bylaws of the cooperative, patronage capital for the year 2024 has been credited to the capital account of each member.

The Cooperative's total margins will be allocated to the residential, commercial/industrial and special contract member-consumer classes based on each class' revenues (excluding taxes) less purchased power costs. The factors for the residential, commercial/industrial and special contract member-consumer classes are \$0.2693381468, \$0.2608710721 and \$0.2608710661 per kilowatt-hour, respectively. As an example, if a residential member consumed 12,000 kilowatt-hours in 2024, the amount credited to the member's patronage capital account for the year is 12,000 x \$0.2693381468 or \$3,232.06.

Any member who desires specific information regarding the amount credited to his patronage capital account may obtain this information on request. This notice is only a statement regarding the assignment of patronage capital.

The Cooperative Difference


The retirement of capital credits is the tangible demonstration of your ownership in Rich Mountain Electric Cooperative (RMEC). As a member-owned cooperative, RMEC operates as a not-for-profit utility. This is accomplished through the retirement of capital credits.

What are Capital Credits?

Any profits made by the cooperative are referred to as margins. At the end of each year, the margins (profits) are allocated to each member in proportion to the amount of electricity purchased. The more electricity purchased, the greater the share of the margin allocation that will be made to the member's capital credit account. When the allocated funds are returned as capital credits to the cooperative's members, those capital credits have been retired.

Assets of the cooperative are owned collectively and held in common by all of the member-owners. From the time the margins are generated until they are returned, this money is put to work within the cooperative, minimizing debt financing and strengthening our financial position.

Before distributing the capital credits, your board of directors at RMEC must first consider the financial condition of the cooperative and the needs for capital funds for the coming years. The amount of the retirement set by the board of directors is an amount that will maintain the financial integrity of the cooperative.

DOWNLOAD THE WECC MEMBER APP TODAY!

HOW DO I FIND THE APP? You can find the app in both the App Store on Apple devices or the Google Play Store on other devices. Type "Woodruff Electric" in the search bar and hit search.

HOW DO I ADD MY ACCOUNT? Once the app is downloaded, this will be the first screen that you will see. Click "add account" button. You can add your account by your account number, the phone number tied to your account or meter number. You must give your account a nickname.

CAN I ADD MORE THAN ONE ACCOUNT? Yes! You must go to the profile tab located in the bottom right corner. Then, you will see in the top right corner a button, "add account." You will add an account in the same manner that you added your first account.

CAN I REPORT A PROBLEM USING THE APP? Yes, you may select "report a problem" and will be prompted to select from a list of options for the nature of the problem. If you have multiple accounts, you must select the affected account before reporting the problem. Member comments are optional to further explain the problem.

WHAT DETAILS ARE INCLUDED IN THE OUTAGE MAP? The map will list the number of members affected by outages, and the outage area will be shaded. You may click on the shaded area for more details about the outage.

CAN YOU VIEW ENERGY USAGE INFORMATION?

- Non-prepay accounts On the usage tab, you select the account, and you can view your usage in kWh or the dollar amount. You may view your usage and cost on a month-to-month basis, going back up to one year.
- Prepay accounts On the usage tab, you will be able to view your daily usage and charges going back up to 30 days. This helps you to determine how much money you need to add to keep your electric service on.

CAN I MAKE A PAYMENT USING THE APP? Yes, you may pay with card or e-check using the app.

Efficiency Pays Double your Black Friday savings

To help reduce energy costs, shoppers can use energy-efficient products to cut bills. Buying items on sale, combined with energy savings, means you save two ways.

From LED lights to insulation, these upgrades pay for themselves over time, and Black Friday may be the perfect time to snag them at a discount. Here's how to shop smart for savings this holiday season.

LED lighting: Bright savings

LED bulbs use up to 80% less energy than incandescent and last 20 times longer. A single LED bulb can save \$100 or more over its lifetime. On Black Friday, many retailers often slash prices on LED packs by 20-40%. Stock up on quality brands for bulbs that will last and that fit every fixture, from warm white to daylight tones, ensuring long-term savings on your electric bill. Also look for LED Christmas lights and décor to celebrate the season without bumping up the bill.

Caulk and weatherstripping: Seal the deal

Drafts around windows and doors can account for 10-20% of home energy loss, especially in the coming colder winter months. Caulk and weatherstripping are affordable fixes — costing as little as \$5-\$15 per tube or roll. Deals often include bundles or discounts on silicone caulk and foam weatherstrips. Applying these in a weekend can save up to \$200 annually on heating and cooling by preventing air leaks.

Spray foam: Expand your savings

Spray foam insulation, like Great Stuff or Touch 'n Seal, fills gaps in walls, attics and crawlspaces, reducing energy loss by up to 20%. A \$10 spray foam can might save \$50 or more yearly on energy bills.

Proper insulation can cut energy costs by 30% in poorly insulated homes. Fiberglass batts or blown-in cellulose are cost-effective options, with savings of \$200 to \$500 per year. Stores may offer deals on insulation rolls or bags, sometimes with free rental of blowing machines, maximizing your investment.

This season prioritize energy-efficient products to shrink your utility bills and double your shopping savings! With sales slashing prices, you'll save upfront and for years to come. Check circulars or websites early, compare deals and invest in a more efficient home.
